Ordinary Fridays Our Catholic life observes Friday with special respect because of the Lord's Passion and Death. The devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus asks us to observe the First Fridays by attending Mass and receiving Holy Communion on nine consecutive First Fridays; it was one of the 12 promises the Lord made to St Margaret Mary during the sixteenth century and has been part of Catholic life ever since. As Catholics we also observe Fridays as days of penance by offering a form of self-denial in thanksgiving for the Lord's gentle mercy and our personal desire for conversion of heart. The Church does not prescribe, however, that fish must be eaten on Fridays. It never did. Abstinence always meant the giving up of meat rather than the eating of fish as a substitute. What the Church does require is that its members abstain on Fridays from meat or some other food or that they perform some alternative work of penance. Here are some practical suggestions for an act of penance on Fridays

- > by abstaining from meat or some other food
- > by abstaining from alcoholic drink, smoking or some form of amusement
- ➤ by making the special effort involved in family prayer, taking part in the Mass, visiting the Blessed Sacrament or praying the Stations of the Cross
- > by fasting from all food for a longer period than usual and perhaps giving what is saved in this way to the needy at home and abroad
- ➤ by making a special effort to help somebody who is poor, sick, old or lonely

Mass intentions Thank you for your Mass intentions. Every day at Mass, the priest offers the prayer of the Mass for intentions brought by you. We believe that the spiritual benefits of Mass are applied to the people for whom Mass is offered in particular the souls of the Faithful Departed or the special intentions of the living. The donation or the stipend for each Mass is your personal gift to the priest for celebrating

the Mass. I am incredibly grateful to you for continuing to ask for Masses to be celebrated for your intentions.

Administration of Holy Communion Due to the prevailing risk, the norm for receiving communion remains on the hand. For those who wish to receive Communion on the tongue, please come to the Altar as the end of the congregational procession has received Communion, as the Minister of Holy Communion will need to sanitise his/her hands after every person receiving on the tongue.

An appreciation of Pope Francis's address to the Priests and Religious Brothers and Sisters of Verona

I share with you my personal appreciation of Pope Francis's recent address to the priests and religious people of Verona. On Saturday 18 May, the day before Pentecost Sunday, Pope Francis made a one day Pastoral Visit to the diocese of Verona in Northern Italy; he made a similar trip a few weeks earlier to the diocese of Venice. During the several hours he spent there, the Pope visited a prison, met with a congregation of young people, celebrated the Pentecost Vigil Mass, and a regular ingredient to all of his pastoral visits both within Italy and beyond, a meeting with clergy. In this short account, I reflect on three topics which encourage and affirm my pastoral ministry as your Parish Priest.

Remember the call: hooked! The Pope began his reflection for priests and religious with the topic of the first call. The Pope reminded the listeners that the origin of Christian life is the experience of encouraging the Lord and he called clergy and religious to remember the day when they encountered the Lord and his call. For the Pope this initial, foundational encounter is the bedrock for a priest's and a religious person's consecration and ministry. He explains that if a religious person looses this awareness and memory there is a dangerous risk of loosing Christ who is the centre of a religious person's life: Christ is the centre.

For me, there's hardly a day that passes when I don't remember my call. I was six and a half years old and I was hooked. I was an altar server and I can remember where I was, that Fr Ken Collins was celebrating Mass and it was Pentecost Sunday. Fr Ken visited our parish every Sunday, helping the parish priest; he was the lecturer in Sacred Scripture at the Oscott Seminary. On that day, Fr Ken began his homily by reciting the Lord's Prayer in Aramaic. After Mass in the sacristy, I asked, "Can you do that again, the Lord's Prayer in its original language?" "Ah, let me see. It goes something like this ...," and recited the Lord's Prayer in its original language for me! I knew that I wanted to be like him. I knew that I wanted to be a priest. I was hooked!

Forgive: just forgive The Pope turned to the topic of apostolic boldness. He notes with affection that this is a characteristic of the priests and religious of Verona; it is a quality of priests all around the world! He builds on this theme with the role model of the Good Samaritan who goes out to heal wounds and the Pope calls for a faith that is translated into a bold mission and repeats a message which has characterised his Pontificate, "... bring the caress of God's mercy ... please, forgive everything, forgive everything."

In the final weeks of seminary, just before ordination, together with my five classmates, Fr Ken made another impression which would be a guiding principal for my pastoral ministry. He led an annual class for the year's ordinands on hearing priests confessions. Fr Ken began characteristically by providing us with a Gospel methodology: hospitality. Fr Ken described: "A priest has called to see you. Make him welcome. He has seen a quality in you that he trusts. Forgive him. Don't ask, just forgive." For me, the class was not a theory lesson: it was about how to be a Confessor. For 24 years, this has been my practice in the Confessional: Forgive. Absolve. Be lenient.

The Pope continues further with this theme of forgiveness. He states, "... the Church needs forgiveness and [priests] are the tools to forgive." He repeats, "We must bring the caress of God's mercy."

It is an incredible privilege to administer God's forgiveness, "the caress of God's mercy" in the Confessional. I am humbled by the personal pilgrimages individual people make to the church and then inside the church to the confessional to receive absolution from me. You have great trust in me! It is a work of mercy. It is awe inspiring to witness God's gentle mercy absolving and liberating you the people entrusted to my pastoral care. Personally, the greater challenge and more demanding action is to forgive myself.

Don't give in to discouragement Next the Pope turns to the gritty reality experienced by priests and religious people all around the world: discouragement. "Do not give in to discouragement" he says. The Pope envisages a Church which is close to peoples wounds and bears witness to God's mercy.

Every religious person in the Church experiences discouragement: lack of results, wavering support, declining numbers of both clergy and parishioners, uncertainty in future ecclesial structures. This is the reality of the Church and the Pope calls us to support each other: a Church of closeness. Last year while in Mongolia and among the priests and pastoral workers there, he gave this encouragement, " ... don't be concerned about small numbers, limited success, or apparent irrelevance. That is not how God works." God continues to work. God still enriches his people through priests and religious brothers and sisters. The books of the Bible weren't written to encourage huge congregations; no, many of the books of the Bible were written to small communities, some being persecuted out of existence, others eking out a new identity and rebuilding after a time of crisis: much like the whole Church is today after the Coronavirus pandemic and the uncertainty accompanying the warfare and violence around the world.

Pope Francis has great confidence in his priests. Priests have been enriched in a number of spiritual, pastoral, intellectual and human areas so that they can anoint and enrich the people entrusted to their pastoral care. The Pope's meeting with the priests and religious of Verona encourages me in north Staffordshire: the successor of Saint Peter has confidence in me to remember that I was hooked aged 6; to forgive; and, never submit to discouragement.
